2. We always try not to park right on top of the Homes initially, as this could put extra pressure on them.

From Jonathan & Saphir: Eur.:

IT ALL STARTED WHEN WE GOT FED UP PAYING HUGE BILLS & rent for a house we couldn't keep up. In the paper we found a Mercedes diesel van for sale for 15,000 Francs. After trying to raise the funds for about 2 months, we were still short 2,000 Francs. So we put it to the Lord that if the guy would not let us have it with a 2,000 F. discount, it wasn't the Lord's will. We grabbed the phone & told the man we'd take his van for 13,000 F. only. He didn't even discuss or argue with us. So the next day it was ours!

THE NEXT MIRACLE WAS

OUTFITTING THE VAN as it was just an empty shell, & we were now broke. We decided to provision the wood to make a bed & seat with storage underneath. Saphir phoned a wood factory & the boss told us to come down the next day with all the measurements we needed. They cut all the wood for us too. We didn't have any windows either, so we phoned a glass factory where they told us the same thing as at the wood factory, & we went to pick up our windows. Then we provisioned a garage mechanic to put them in for us.

SO WE HAD OUR VAN READY, BUT NO CARAVAN & we were broke. We received together the vision of Dad on a tree sawing off the branch by faith, so we decided to give a due date for leaving our house—3 months. With 15 more days to go, one morning I passed by an old mailbox & there was an old wet newspaper, 1 month old. The Lord told me to open it.

So I did & read, "FOR SALE: CARAVAN, 5½ meters, bunk beds ... everything we needed. So I ran to the phone & said, "I'll buy it!" We arranged a date to pay for it & phoned all our friends & kings, but no one could afford to help us! At that time Saphir went to the hospital to have our 3rd child. I phoned her father asking for help but he couldn't help either.

WE HAD ONE MORE WEEK LEFT IN OUR HOUSE, but as Dad says, "Faith is positive, faith is sure, faith is knowing" & the next day Saphir's father sent a telegram saying he wanted to see the caravan & advanced us the money to buy it, GBH! So 3 days before we were due to leave our house we had a big caravan, big enough for our family of 5! PTL! He never fails in one. In one town the priest did it for us. In another town, the old folks home, in another a woman we hadn't even met sent her daughter to ask us for our dirty laundry so she could wash it! In the same place we found breakfast in a basket outside our door on 3 different days also! In the last 2½ months since being mobile we haven't paid more than \$4 on diesel, because the Lord has supplied free fuel!

to be a good sample in our appearance & that we still need to be good bait!

4. When we first arrive in a new city we try to go out & get to know the town & situation & maybe sing with the kids & let's a little, meet people etc., so we are a good testimony to the brothers & sisters & have testimonies to share too about their own area. That really helps the Homes to feel at one with us. We try to do this when possible before we even contact the Home.

5. Our initial contact with the Home is important, whether it be by phone or a brief visit if they can't be reached by phone, especially as the Homes we've been visiting we've never been to before. Most of the Homes have been notified previously by the KOS that we are travelling & visiting & so they are expecting us at some time or other. But our first contact & conversation tells a lot about how receptive they are to having us in their area, & then we proceed from there.

6. We know ourselves that 5 kids & 2 adults is quite a handful to be invited to a Home, & so we usually suggest a picnic at the beach or a park where everyone can have fun & relax, & the children are free & happy too. This takes the pressure off the Home

so they don't have to be concerned about cooking a special meal, cleaning up or any extra work.

7. We've found from experience that it's very hard to keep 5 active time to have fellowship with every individual & get to know them a little.

11. It's important to know everyone & give each the same time when possible, as some will try to take more of your time than others, & the quieter ones could feel left out.

12. We also try to have the kids share some songs with everyone which is lots of fun & very inspiring. Everyone loves music, & it soon gets others involved playing & singing in turn around the circle. We have had really good inspirational times together doing skits, singing, sharing testimonies, taking photos too & showing how the caravan works & sharing how we do it with the children.

13. Homes with children are often more appreciative & more aware of our needs too for help with laundry, showers, food etc. So many Homes have said how encouraging it is to see us together & still going for the Lord with our big family. So many are amazed & ask all the time how we manage it. The fact that we are a big family & were able to get our rig together so quickly with the help of Family, Fish & of course the Lord & that we support ourselves too by singing, It's a blessing, mail ministry etc. In just the same way as they do, also makes them feel close to us & able to relate to us more. They are often amazed that we travel by faith, & this is such an encouragement to us because we know only too well our own shortcomings & failures & know we still have a long way to go ourselves.

14. One important factor that has had a very big effect & in fact has made our ministry possible is that we are already known intimately thru the Letters. The

4-5 hours & even 6 or more sometimes, but Home visits are usually shorter & usually last about 3-4 hours. This is usually enough with every individual & get to know them a little.

15. We don't get involved with the problems of the Home as that isn't our job, but we just try to encourage & love & inspire the Homes, as love is the greatest force in the world & what everybody needs is love, it's positive & it's faith-building & it's creative. It's good to forget about our problems & just stop & praise the Lord & share all the great things He has done for us. Let's talk about Jesus!

17. Remembering the names of everyone is important too, & we always try to write down everyone's names so that later when we send them a thank-you note we can mention them by name, as the personal touch means so much more & it shows you love & care.

18. We always write thank-you notes & when possible we send photos of our picnic or other times together.

19. We are working on a slide show too, which is really inspiring. Also, slides are a lot cheaper to develop than photos. We also have Bible slides in colour which we plan to show while playing the "Story of Love" tapes. This will really be good for the children & we're thinking of teaching Gabriel, 10, to show the slides to the children while we share with the big people.



EAST BLOC TRAVEL TIPS!

BULGARIA & RUMANIA: An Int'l. Driving Permit is essential for these countries. Americans can officially obtain one only in the U.S., altho' I know of some who have gotten it in Europe.

DIESEL FUEL is very difficult if not impossible to obtain, due to a desperate shortage.

PETROL is usually very low octane—maximum of 86. Ignition would need to be retarded to cope & care taken in driving due to the consequent loss of

power.

PETROL STATIONS ARE FEW & far between, so care must be taken not to let fuel drop below ½ tank. Queues of one hour for petrol are usual.

ENGINE OIL is of poorer quality, & Western oil should be taken in to avoid overheating problems.

PETROL COUPONS must be bought at the border & paid for in Western currency.

SPARE PARTS for Western cars are not available at all in these countries. If you break down, getting spares is an ardu-

ous business, but the inevitable bureaucracy can be helped along with a greased palm! Patience & persistence are the keys.

ROADS are not too good & signs appear in Cyrillic Script (like Russian) in Yugoslavia & Bulgaria. (Yugoslavia & Bulgaria are both Slavic countries, but Rumania has more in common with French, & French-speakers should be able to make themselves understood without much difficulty.) All writing in Rumania is Roman.

THE BLACK MARKET flourishes in these countries as there is a shortage of everything, & queues for what there is. Whilst the Black Market is illegal & frowned upon by the government, it is a tolerated institution as it brings in much needed foreign currency. You can normally get 3 times as much as at the bank, so take as much as is possible.

CAMPSPACES, altho' basic & rudimentary, are very cheap.

VISAS should be obtained at the Embassy before beginning the trip & not obtained at the border.
